


Of the US population only speaks English

Note: A "limited English-speaking household" is one in which no member 14 years and over speaks only English or speaks a non-English language and speaks English "very well." In other words, all members 14 years and over have at least some difficulty with English.

Legal Interventions

Civil Rights Act of 1964

Federal intervention which is the backbone of language access legislation



Clinton's Executive Order

Gears language service choices towards the prominent languages in the area & limits requirements on providers based on budgets



State Choice

States get federal funding, mainly through Medicaid and CHIP, to cover language services

States that Reimburse Providers for Language Services


